## North East OWL

OWLNEG member and Aberdeen City Ranger Duncan McNeil delivered one of the workshops at the recent OWL Scotland Networking weekend at Pillars of Hercules farm in Fife. Duncan's workshop was on safe fire-lighting techniques for use by outdoor practitioners and he also showed us how to make charcoal pencils over the fire.



Chair Doug Gooday delivered twilight CPD sessions on safe fire-lighting to teachers and staff from Skene School and Mintlaw Academy. The sessions covered: safety and risk assessment, Scottish Outdoor Access Code (SOAC), behaviour guidelines, equipment and resources, Curriculum for Excellence Links, five-minute fires, Kelly Kettles and Leave no Trace principles.

On Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> September 2022, OWLNEG partnered with the First Aid Training Co-operative to deliver an Outdoor First Aid Course for Forest School and Outdoor Learning Leaders. The course provided a brilliant session outlining the fundamentals of first aid for forest school practitioners.

The venue this time was Leochel Cushnie Village Hall (near to Alford). Duncan McNeill, our trainer for the weekend, made the course relevant, challenging and very enjoyable.

I think I can speak for all the participants in saying that we all came away feeling more confident and secure in our knowledge and understanding of first aid and clearer about our responsibilities.



In the last 3 months, John Malster, an OWLNEG member, has run 7 workshops on wildflowers and meadows. Two of these were in Aberdeen in conjunction with St. Machar Cathedral and Earth & Worms Community Garden. There were a further 2 events run in Portlethen: one for Scottish Countryside Rangers Association and one for Aberdeenshire Council Ranger Service. Another 2 events were in association with Haddo Country Park and an event in Huntly was run for Deveron Arts. Attendance at these workshops ranged from 18 to 2, with an average of around 10 participants. We hope that many people will now start sowing local provenance seed in Aberdeen City and Shire.

## **Other News**

### **Branching Out update – Nathalie Moriarty, Branching Out Manager**

In 2007, the Scottish Forestry Branching Out Programme was launched. It is aimed at people with moderate to severe mental health conditions receiving direct NHS or charity support. It started with three pilots and there are now 35 regular groups running every year. For each group, 12 clients meet once a week, for three months in a local woodland, and are supported by two certified Branching Out leaders and one mental health worker. They complete their John Muir certificates through a variety of activities such as bushcraft, plant ID, environmental surveys, health walks and mindfulness activities, to name just a few.

Over the last couple of years we have given a particular focus to building regional hubs that can deliver the programme. These are essentially regional support groups that help the organisations and people that deliver and refer to the programme. Should we be building up capacity in your geographic area, you will see further advertisements locally via various platforms, including the OWL Scotland networks



and greenspace health partnerships, where we will advertise for new organisations to get involved.

If you want to find out more about work in this field, a good start would be to widen your network contacts in green therapy and investigate whether you have a local green health partnership group, and if you can join it. This may open up opportunities for multiple avenues of green health work in Scotland.

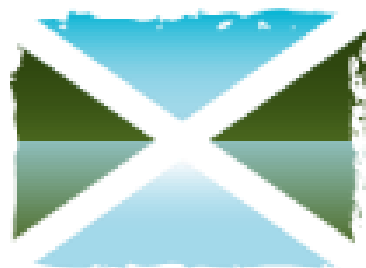
## Other updates on Outdoor Learning
